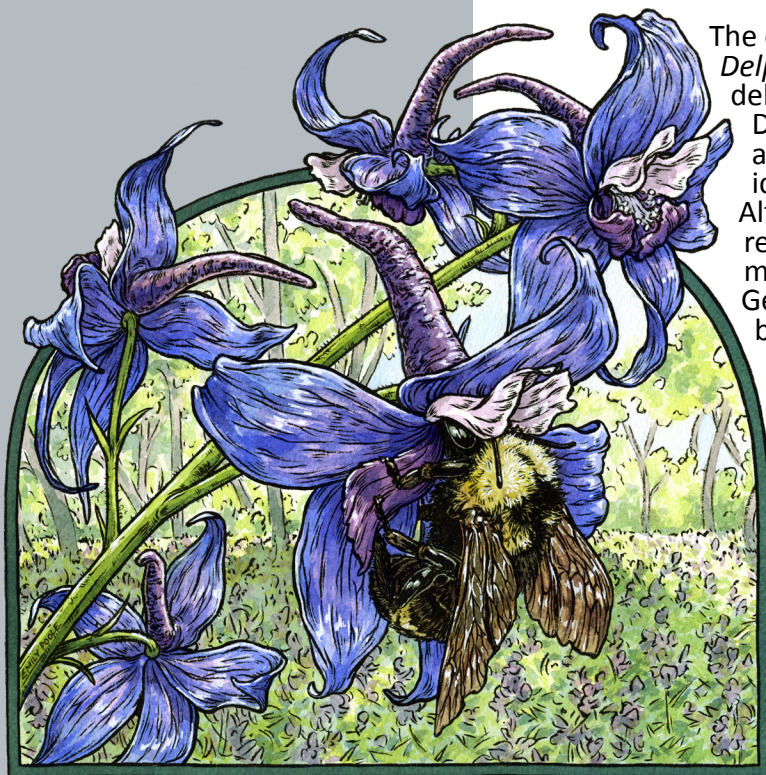

A Pollinator's Perfect Match

The tall Columbian larkspur (*Delphinium trolliifolium*) deserves the spotlight as the poster species for the 2025 Wildflower Festival. It is a stunning plant with electric blue-purple flower spikes that border the Water Garden Trails at Mount Pisgah Arboretum beginning in mid-April. Along the Coast Fork of the Willamette River under the Oregon ash canopy, it shares its riparian habitat with Pacific bleeding heart, tall western meadow rue, giant trillium, yellow stream violets, and cow parsnip.

A member of the Ranunculaceae, or Buttercup Family, larkspurs in the genus *Delphinium* are common and speciose. Eighteen species are native to Oregon, with the two most common west of the Cascades being Columbian larkspur, and the later blooming Menzies' larkspur (*Delphinium menziesii*), which lives on the drier hillsides of Mount Pisgah.



The origins of the names *Delphinium* and larkspur are ancient. *Delphinium* is derived from the Greek word for dolphin, delphinion, which was the name applied to these plants in Discorides' *Materia De Medica*. Written over 2,000 years ago, this work was one of the most influential pharmacological texts and remained so through the Renaissance period. Alternatively, the flower shape of some species might have resembled classical dolphin sculptures. Larkspur as a common name for these plants first appears in a 15th century German text and refers to the flower's spur and its resemblance to the long hind claw (spur) that is a distinctive feature of larks, including the Streaked Horned Lark, which can be found in the Willamette Valley.

Because of its gorgeous floral display and lovely foliage, Columbian larkspur is a native gardening star in the Willamette Valley. It likes partial shade, and thrives in average Willamette Valley gardens. Another claim to fame is that larkspurs are poisonous if ingested by cattle and other livestock.

The poster artist, Emily Poole, has nicely illustrated the flower's most interesting feature, the prominent spur protruding behind five spreading sepals – often referred to as “petals.” The four actual petals are small and nestled in the center of the sepals, and the upper white petals are also spurred and enclosed within the sepal spur, where nectar is located.

A long tongue is required to reach the nectar, but just any long tongue will do. With the brilliant blue-purple sepals serving as the attractant, the petals limit access, effectively blocking all but certain pollinators. The lower pair of petals cover the flower's stamens and pistils so that only visitors landing and exerting weight on the petals can push down and make contact. Hummingbirds are frequent visitors but are unlikely to be very good pollinators as their hovering behavior allows them to sip nectar without picking up or depositing pollen. It takes a large and particularly long-tongued bumble bee to push apart the lower petals while she stretches for nectar.



Hummingbirds are ill-suited for pollination in this species in another important way. The flowers of Columbian larkspur bloom in sequence from the bottom up and are protandrous, meaning that (male) anthers mature before the (female) stigmas. Thus, as the bloom continues upward, flowers with fertile male parts are always found at the top-most open flowers. This is an important mechanism for limiting self-pollination, as a visitor moving up a flower spike would be making contact with female flowers first and depositing pollen from a different individual. Bumble bees habitually forage from the bottom up on inflorescences, enhancing this mechanism, while hummingbirds tend to move from the top down.

The bloom of Columbian larkspur coincides harmoniously with the emergence of queen California bumble bees (*Bombus fervidus*), which possess one of the longest tongues of our common bumble bee species and provide the perfect match for *Delphinium's* larkspurred nectaries.

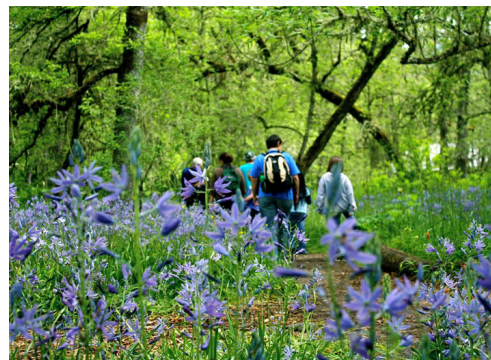

Restoring our Meadows

For many years we have dreamed of our meadows flourishing, returning to a brilliant display of native flora and fauna. Two years ago, we started exploring how we could take on this restoration project, mapping out what we can accomplish and the right techniques for the job and the land. After reviewing similar projects and connecting with similar organizations, we determined a combination of solarization and sheet mulching with plans on future prescribed burns was going to be the ticket.

Restoration of this kind is a long term project, so we selected a pilot area where visitors could see the impact, a small area across from the barn. This location is a reasonable size, enclosed by trails, so we can easily access and manage with minimal impact on surrounding vegetation or interference from unwanted seeds.



We mowed the area as low as we could and layed a large plastic tarp out flat to create the tightest seal possible in November 2023. Knowing that a winter solarization was not going to create the most desirable conditions, we planned to leave the tarp down for an extended period of three months.

Then came the 2024 ice storm! As we dealt with the storm damage, this project shifted to the back burner and the tarp stayed down close to five months. In April, we pulled up the tarp and subsequently planted 480 native plants during our Earth Day volunteer event. Looking back, I should have waited to plant until any residual non-native seed bank had germinated and could be removed, but as the saying goes "hindsight is 20/20".

A few weeks later we laid the tarp out over the adjacent plot, this time for a summer solarization. When we pulled the tarp off a few months later, the summer burn off proved to be much more effective. We recently started planting that area with a few native annuals from the Friends of Buford Park's native plant nursery and have a good number of returning camas that survived far enough down in the soil.

We are also sheet mulching with layers of cardboard and bark chips in areas that are too tight for tarping and around plants we would like to keep. We've used this method around the site in the past and found it effective for suppressing grasses for a couple of seasons.



The last technique that we'll utilize for meadow restoration is still in its infancy stages for the Arboretum. We plan to begin conducting prescribed burns in 2026! We've been connecting with partner organizations and learning more about how they utilize and conduct prescribed burns, and we are so appreciative of the opportunity to learn from their experience. Currently, all the prescribed burns that have happened in Howard Buford Recreation Area have occurred outside of the Arboretum's lease area. We are looking forward to seeing how our meadows will benefit and flourish in the future.

I want to give a big thanks to everyone who has helped out along the way, we couldn't execute these projects without the support of our volunteers, partners, and donors.
